*Meg's nightmare began when she 'promoted' a client that she met at work to be her boyfriend last year.



This man was a gambling addict who was in so much debt that his wife left him. Meg had compassion on him, not only did she help him repay his debts; she also helped this man take care of his two children. This had cost Meg the money that she worked so hard to earn and forced her to remain in the business. The man had also threatened her to be 'obedient' or he would tell her family that she was a prostitute. This had really worn her down.

Meg had told us firmly that she hoped to put an end to this nightmare. Immediately we started looking for possible solutions. We talked about how to end the relationship, prayed for her, and so on, hoping to help her leave the man. Yet when we went to visit Meg again, she said, "He is in a really poor condition and if I don't help him, no one else will. Plus I am really worried that he will tell my family about my job; let's just leave it as it is now."

Not to be a child, but be a companion

Ageing is not magic; we cannot simply assume that a person would grow in discernment as he/she ages. And once that person is able to discern, he/she often hesitates to make a decision. A relationship like that of Meg and her boyfriend is not something new among prostitutes, and there are many who, like Meg, choose to remain silent. However, is it only the case among prostitutes? Do we ordinary people know our roles and responsibilities well enough to bear the consequences of our decisions?

May we all learn not to become a grown up child and, at the same time, encourage others to grow. Our ministry seeks to help prostitutes spot the blind spots in their lives, and to walk and grow with them in Christ's love through giving guidance, encouragement and support.

Although Oli and his family have since moved to another place, we are still able to keep in touch with them. Currently we are trying to adapt to the changes brought by this move, as well as waiting for a breakthrough in sharing our faith. During our recent visits, all I could do was to help with their homework. Not being able to share my faith, I was left rather discouraged. Yet, God never fails to deliver surprises. I was able to experience His faithfulness more profoundly and learn that everything must take place according to His schedule.

Breakthrough: I am not afraid of ghosts!

During a recent visit, Oli told us that he enjoys watching horror movies. He said that even though he is so afraid of ghosts that he would hide himself in his mother's bed after watching a horror movie, he would still watch these movies. I therefore seized this opportunity to tell him that I am not afraid of ghosts and began a conversation on faith with him. He thought the reason why Christians always wear a cross was that we have to prove our identity as Christians with it. I then explained to him that we Christians have the Holy Spirit dwelling in us, which is the reason why we are not afraid of ghosts, and that we do not need to wear a cross to prove that we are Christians.



Through this visit, God has really changed my perspective of service. He has also encouraged me to observe submissively and loyally as He opens the doors to the hearts of these Pakistani families, as well as to sow seeds of the good news upon hearing His command.

Weeks Unity is no longer a dream

During my 9-day mission trip in France, I learnt that unity among members of Christ was not just a dream.

Putting differences aside for breakfast

There are 150 Christian denominations in the whole of France, yet it was not until 4 or 5 years ago that Christians in the country started promoting the idea of uniting the churches. While staying in the south with my team, I attended an inter-denominational Easter breakfast meeting. The 7 local churches were of different denominations and, due to their differences, each carried out ministries on their own. They rarely met with one another, not to mention working together. Therefore, this breakfast meeting was really a breakthrough.

My team was made up of 9 people from

different countries, cultures and denominations. With such great differences among us, how could we manage to distribute literature, pay visits and rehearse a drama for a Good Friday service, while keeping the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace as the Bible said? The key, I believe, lies in whether we were able to lay ourselves down.

Seeking our common ground to glorify Christ

The experience of preparing for the Good Friday service drama was unforgettable. The nine of us spoke different mother tongues, came from different cultures and denominations and had different hobbies. Yet we were able to work together and completed the drama within three days. The drama was about a group of people from different countries who had come together to discuss how to celebrate Easter. However, because everyone had a different way to celebrate and was stubborn about it, the group ended up quarrelling. At last, thanks to the song "A Purple Robe", everyone realized that, instead of the format, the most important thing about celebrating Easter was remembering that Christ died for us. Just as

the message of the drama suggested, if we intend to lift ourselves up, the focus will be on our differences from one another. Yet when we lay ourselves down, we will be able to focus on what we believe in common, lifting up and glorifying the name of Christ.

Unity is the best sign for people to recognize the children of God, among both different churches and different church members. May this unity become more than something that we talk about! May it be more than just a dream!




Mabel, a member of Christian Faith Hope Love Church (Shek Kip Mei), completed a mission training at OM Lifehope in late July.
